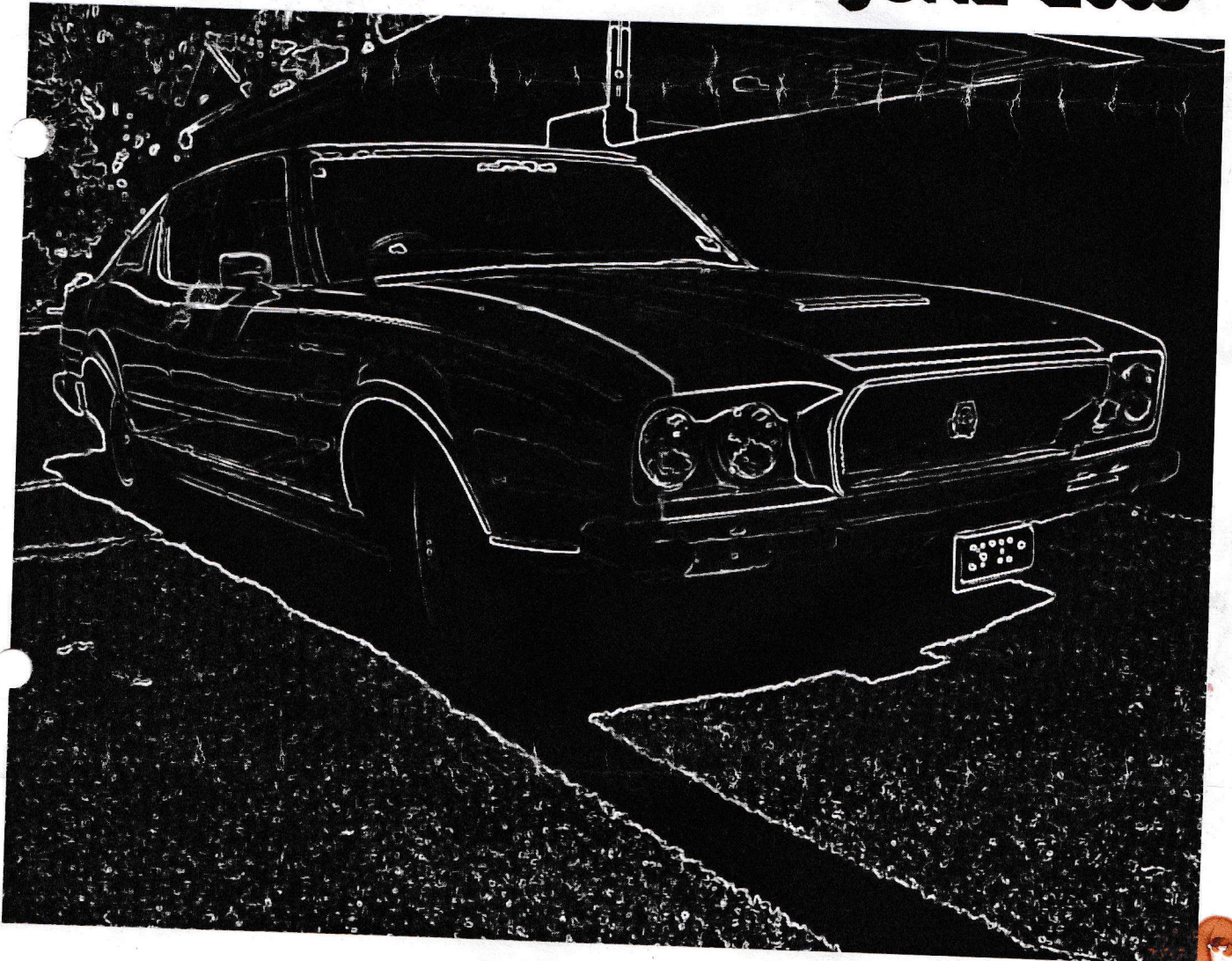

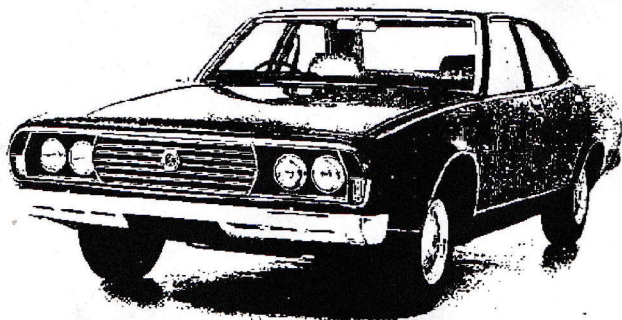

Another P76 Travel Story

Well after 36 years of owning a P76 I thought a little history might be of some interest.

I purchased the car new after reading Evan Green's praise of the coming of the all Australian car. I waited till the quality of the manufacturer was good and then made the choice between the "P" and the HQ Holden. I chose the "P" as I thought it would best suit towing my caravan, which it did admirably for thousands of miles. I purchased the "P" from Purnell Motors at Arncliffe from whom I bought my Morris Major Elite which gave me great value for many years. What a reliable vehicle it was, I passed it onto my son who used it to go back and forth to university for three years and he passed it onto a friend and I saw it running around town years later.

I took the "P" back to Purnell's because it had a humming through the floor, he got into trouble for spending too much time with me, and still could not locate the problem. I found it to be only when I had the roof racks on. So what do you know? We had some wonderful trips with the van in tow especially Whitsundays, Airlie Beach staying at Shute Harbour Caravan Park.

With the van unoccupied one day we drove into Airlie Beach and parked nose first into the curb overlooking the water and opposite the pub. When attempting to start to go home the starter motor let us down. This turned out to be one of the good things to happen in life in what was to follow. My late son was 14 years at the time and I allowed him to wind up the jack at the side front of the car.
