Undoubtedly one of the highlights of the weekend for many of was this visit, the one where we took the big group photo, and the rather interestingly curved line of Leyland's, not the greatest photo for viewing all the cars but special in its own way. Sorry Mike!



Having debated the likelihood of getting stuck on the berm, we headed off for our welcome and introduction to the museum. I used extreme self-control to not take hundreds of photos of the thousands of exhibits in the many sheds and enclosures outside. In discussion with one of the staff we learnt that while the museum collects and indeed is gifted enormous amounts of stuff, read crockery to fire appliances and all in between, their rules do not permit the selling, trading or otherwise of anything they gain possession off. Me thinks a harsh and backward ruling preventing progress and possibly promoting the loss of many exhibits. In one enclosure I saw more Trekka's than I'd ever thought I would! Accompanied by many a Bedford as well and Wolseley, Ford and other abandoned forlorn vehicles.

There were restoration/trade training workshops as well, indeed one was working on a chassis I surmised to be of military origin but hey, I'm guessing. The worker was heard to say that it is harder to get young people into the place to do some of the urgently needed work and assist with restoration and maintenance AND learn some valuable skills along the way.

I mentioned previously how I'd need two car transporters to take my wish list home. Maybe one with a big low loader would be better. The Dennis F8 and Leyland Comet fire appliances along with the DX Vauxhall, the Kimberley (reupholstered in an astonishing multi tone green) the Morris 8 E type and if space allowed a further difficult choice or two could be made.

Along with several smaller exhibits of course, the pedal car and dolls house for Abby and some models for me. There was a wealth of historic everything on display. Domestic appliances, steam engines, toys, cars, trucks and tractors, period furniture, artworks,

lawnmowers, prams, signs, bottle agricultural equipment. I think I even saw a boat. Stoves, typewriters, big model boats, washing machines that really looked scary, tools, radio equipment, B&W televisions, period clothing, photos and paintings! Like I said where to stop. 

On Sunday 6th November 1983, the first meeting of the P76 Club was held in Mt Maunganui to decide the feasibility of a club.

The response has been excellent - while eight cars attended, support, enquiries and apologies received have indicated a definite interest. I have seventy-six owners names to date. The meeting was a very casual affair with a large cross-section of our typical NZer represented. We met, discussed the cars, club ideas, and then had a picnic lunch at the Papamoa Domain. Of the eight cars, one Executive, three Super and four Delux models - all V8s - were there.

The meeting had several constructive and definite outcomes:

1. CLUB AIMS:

that - we closely liase with our 2 year old Australian counterparts

- parts supply and technical information be prime aims

- the organisation be open, casual and regularly informative

- P76 history be explored and the P76 be promoted actively

2. ORGANISATION:

that - the Club be Hamilton based (P P Box 1026, Ph(071)395601)

- the Club be officially incorporated

- a bank account be opened with the National Bank, Hamilton

- a próvisional committee be appointed

3. AGM:

that - a General Meeting be held within six weeks in Hamilton, PROVIDED THAT TWENTY PAID UP SUBSCRIPTIONS HAVE BEEN RECEIVED

The purpose of my writing is, FIRSTLY to inform you of current progress; SECONDLY to infate returns of your Membership Applications with the \$36 joining fee (by the way, the "Compliance Plate" is a number stamped under the bonnet on the LHFront eg. '076E4S4A44 16036') and THIRDLY, assuming your interest, to canvas your ideas about how the Club should be run, our aims, affiliations etc; obtain a list of the faults, remedies and queries of your car, and importantly to get an insight into your background, family, and of course, your car.

Gordon Murray's story about his P76

May 1974 I purchased my first P76, the car was a Deluxe V8 column change with the luxury pack, the colour been Corinthian blue that I still have today. The purchased price \$3400? The Dealer I purchased this car from was Sharpes Garage at Cessnock. On looking at all the colour range I selected the orange P76 with a black vinal roof. The dealer could not acquire a vehicle of this nature and informed me that there was a Deluxe V8 column change at Kempsey, or was it Taree, but it was Corinthian blue fitted with a luxury pack for another \$110. After a bit of haggelling he wiped the \$110 off the price. The deal was done and he had the car shipped down to Cessnock. Three days later I picked the car up. During this period of selling the Leyland P76 Sharpes Garage were giving away a free lawn mower with every P76 sold. On picking up the car I went over it with the Dealer to check everything and when he opened the boot there it was (not a 44 gallon (205litre) drum) but a large cardboard box with a brand new Victa Utility lawn mower in it. For the first 12 months I had much less faults with the mower then I did with the car, but in the long run the P76 came out on top).

Since I purchased this vehicle I have gave it a complete makeover by changing the colour to a Nissan red, nearly all of the deluxe fittings have been removed and replaced and this car now resembles a super model. Also the manual gear box was replaced and a Borgwarner 35 box fitted.

In the first 12 months of owning this vehicle I had it back to the dealer with minor faults mainly water leaks through the front and back windscreens and also the front doors. All these faults were rectified over time and new raised foot plates fitted. The car developed a small miss in the motor and was taken back to the dealer to investigate what the miss was, after checking the spark plugs, points, condenser and carby etc, they discovered that the valley cover gasket was leaking and sucking in air, this was replaced by a thicker gasket and this vehicle went like a charm, all these faults were rectified while the car was still under warranty. All up I think I have owned 7 P76s, the second one that I acquired was a super V8 auto that was a write off, another two were full of rust and I scrapped them (kept most usable parts). The other three were all V8s that I sold (wishing now that I would have kept them) but where do you store them.


