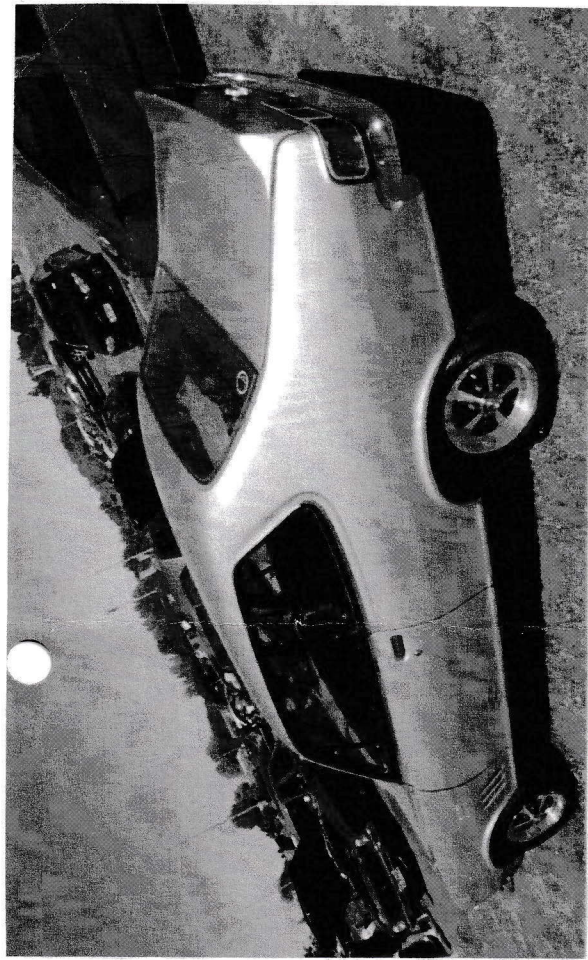
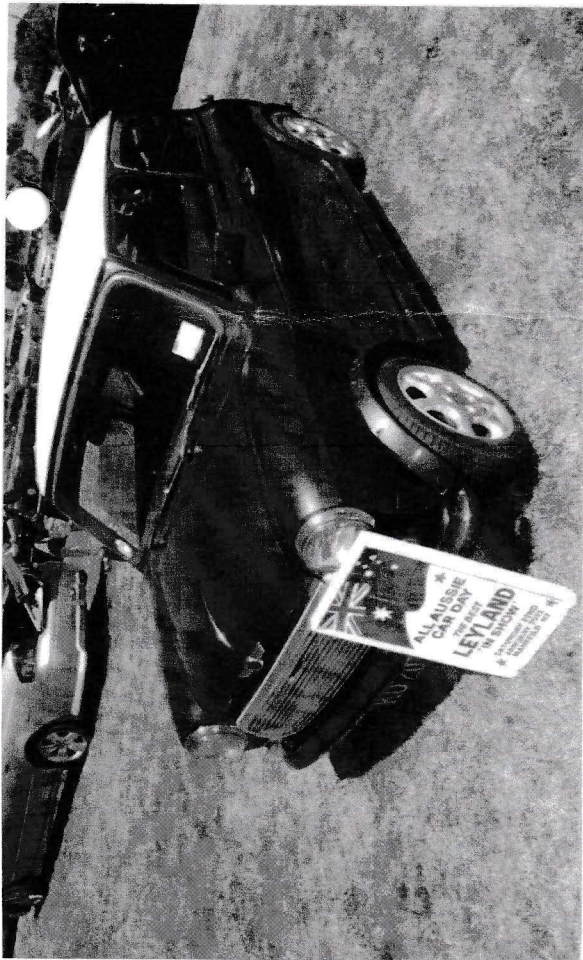
The new beneficiary, I Am Hope, a youth and community support group benefitted by \$9500 raised on the day through sponsorship and entry fees. Great effort for a good cause.

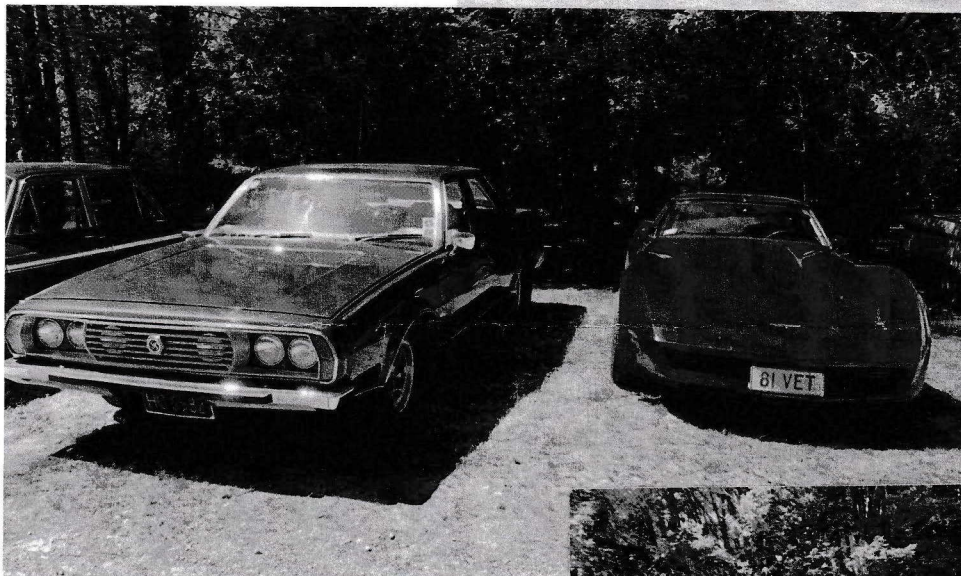
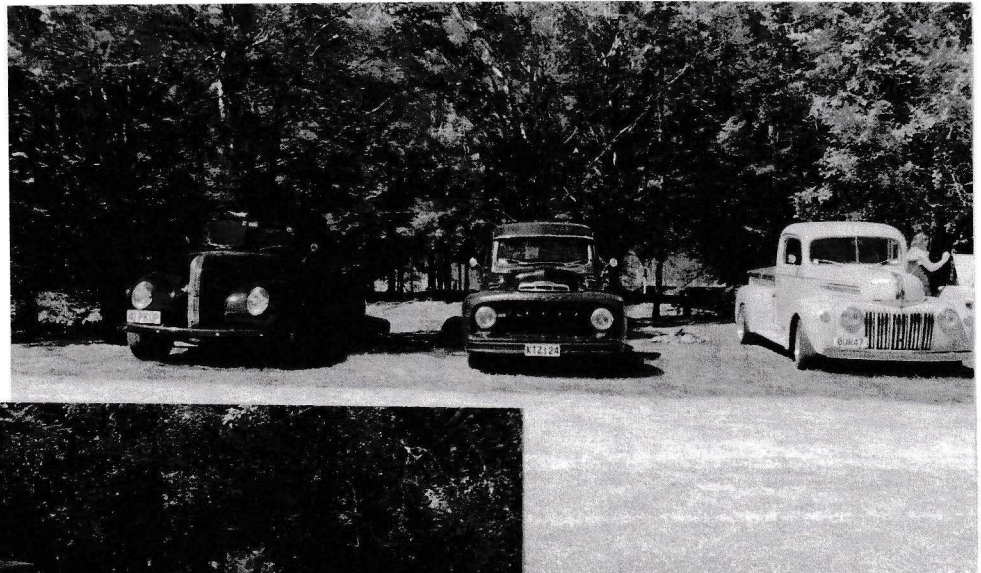
Anyway, we gathered and headed to Nelson Creek (approx. 45mins from Reefton) after turning off at Ngahere on the highway to Greymouth.

Best Deluxe IS6940 Andrew van Kampen

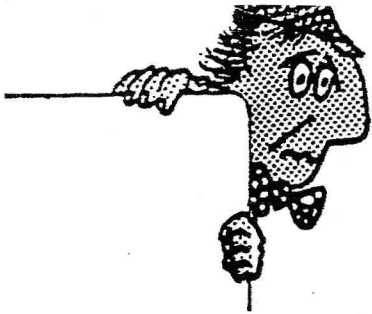
Best Overall P76 V8 Ron Butler and my special award today - Loudest stereo Marie Gibbs

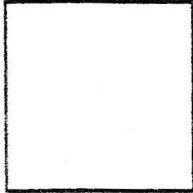
