THE LEYLAND P76 40TH ANNIVERSARY TRIP...

The Leyland P76 40th Anniversary trip for Geoff & I started on the Friday 28 June when we flew to Canberra with Di & Nigel Bray. After picking up the hire car we headed for the Ainslie Football Club for a meal meeting up with a lot of old friends from the interstate clubs picking up conversations as if we saw them yesterday. We headed to the seminar room for the first talk of the weekend with guest speakers Alan Nicholson, Max Hamilton, ex employees of B.M.C., and other speakers. Di and I after a few minutes left the boys and headed for the lounge for a catch up talk and then I donated a few coins to the club via the machines.

After the talk it was off to the Rydges Hotel via a couple of wrong turns (I was navigating with the help of Tom Tom) missed the turn and went across the lake towards government house got back on track and booked in by then it was about 10 pm.



It was an early start on Saturday morning with a bit of rain but the cars in an array of colours gathered in the car park ready to leave for the 100 odd kms Gundaroo

run which recreated the original run for the media launch. Geoff & Nigel travelled with Allan Schutz from the Qld Club in his lovely Corinthian Blue 6 cylinder P76 while Di & I took the short cut direct to Gundaroo. Whilst the cavalcade of cars were tripping round the mountains and stopping for coffee at the Radio



Telescope Lookout Di & I had breakfast at Capitol Wines Cellar Door and Grazing restaurant, I shared Di's breakfast of home made bread and a selection of their chutneys and spreads (I had to cancel my order as hers was way too much for 1) we kept warm and out of the rain by the log fire.

Finally the cars arrived..... Force 7's, station wagon, modifieds plus all other models.



They had been via Honeysuckle Creek, Tidbinbilla Deep Space Tracking Station Paddys River then on to Gundaroo. The local members of the Gundaroo Rural Fire Service were very patient they put on a BBQ lunch with hot tea, coffee and cake which was welcome by the drivers and passengers who were running late. After more chatting we all headed back to the hotel to relax before dressing for the formal dinner, others to clean and prepare cars for the concours the next day.

PRESIDENT'S RAMBLINGS

Something different this month. A travelogue. We just returned from a 3 week jaunt to Lawn Hill NW Queensland. We got back from the P76 40th Anniversary celebrations in Canberra on the Sunday night and after getting the house in order, took off about midday Monday, caravan in tow, heading north. First stop Mambray Creek overnighter then on through Quorn, Hawker, Leigh Creek, Maree and 50 Kms up the Birdsville Track to Clayton Wetlands. This is a beaut little spot just off the "track" that has a plastic water tank about 4 metres in diameter and 1 metre deep that can be filled with warm artesian water. Hot shower and toilets as well. Outback spa very therapeutic.

The next morning after another spa and farewells to other campers who had also overnighted there, we set off north for Mungerrannie. Beautifull wetlands here and another artesian spa too, quite busy here as there is a pub and it's about half way along the track ,so, many camping travellers going both ways. We had a shower after dark and as it was a new moon, very dark. Di walked back in the general direction of the van but really had no idea where it was and missed it by 10 degrees and was heading back to Adelaide. I had an inkling she wasn't sure where the van was and I went looking and saw this torchlight flashing around about 50 metres away in the middle of nowhere. I flashed (my torch) in that direction assuming it was her and I could see a change of direction. Situation averted.

Onward to Birdsville, the track was in fair condition but with the usual stony stretches. We popped 2 tyres along here but had invested in a tyre pressure monitor which keeps a check on both the D-max and the caravan tyres. As soon as the pressure drops below 25 psi (or whatever you set it to) an alarm sounds inside the cab. We carry 2 spares for Max and 2 for the van just for these situations. The tyre was still going down by the time we stopped so the tyres were not shredded and able to be repaired when we got to Birdsville. Pretty busy as there was The Simpson Desert marathon happening the following weekend and into the next week. After a quiet night we packed up and headed off via the Bakery which was doing a roaring trade. North of here the road is a mix of fair gravel and single lane sealed roads but as we got closer to Mt Isa the gravel roads disappeared. We overnighted north of Boulia just off the road.

Headed for Mt Isa and stocked up on a few basics then headed for Cloncurry. Camped beside a creek near a Burke and Wills cairn then turned north to Gregory Downs via Burke and Wills Roadhouse. Good sealed road on this stretch. Camped at Gregory Downs in a freeby with many other caravans, camper trailers and mobile homes of varying sizes.

Headed west the next day on fair gravel road again. Road works for many kilometers as there is the Century zinc mine out here and they truck the concentrate out and need good roads to do this. We were not in a hurry so didn't bother us. Had another puncture on a stony stretch and arrived at Adels Grove early afternoon.



The Grove camping area is in constant shade all day as it is set in amongst tropical palms of some sort, nice and cool for tents and campers but we elected to camp just



outside of this area so we could use the solar panels and generator if required. We stayed 6 nights here, beautiful spot alongside the Lawn Hill Creek which is 100 metres wide, went kayaking most days, a bit of walking but generally did nothing. Did a couple of trips to Boodjamulla (Lawn Hill) National Park 10 kms up the road where towering sandstone cliffs form the Lawn Hill Gorge through which the Lawn Hill Creek runs with its lush vegetation make it a vision splendid.

Time to move on but we still had 200 odd kms of dirt road so to minimize the risk of another flat, I put the 2 caravan spares with brand new tyres on the back axle of Max. These wheels have the same PCD but a different

offset so probably wouldn't run them long term. So with low pressures we set off for Camoweal. The last 40 odd kms was pure marbles with speeds more than 50 kph causing Max and van to wander all over the road. Despite that we made it with no tyre troubles and found a camp just west of the town next to billabong sharing with probably 20 or so other campers. Quiet night.

On down the road turning left at Three Ways, Tennant Creek, camping at Devil's Marbles where we snuck in with 70 others. We have never seen so





many people there but I guess it's an indicator of just how many grey nomads and others are on the road these days. South again down through Alice Springs, camped at a roadside stop about 65 kms south of there. On through Erldunda, Kulgera, Marla to just north of Coober Pedy where by this time we have gone from shorts and tee shirts to long pants, jumpers and umbrellas. There is a howling west wind complete with rain which did nothing for fuel consumption. In the morning a fellow traveller but on a Harley stopped to get some circulation happening so we offered him a cup of coffee. After talking for a bit he told us he had 3 sets of thermals on under 2 jumpers and leathers and was still freezing. Moving on,

next night roadside stop north of Port Augusta. In the morning set off again in the freezing cold, Di had a craving for Barnacle Bills but we were too early at Port Augusta so we headed onto Pirie where the craving was satisfied. We could have made it home that night but spent one more night on the road at Auburn. Home next day and back to reality.
